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FUN FACTS ABOUT EAFWR



Extend-A-Family Waterloo Region was created in 1981 after a group of parents sitting around a kitchen table dreamed of a more inclusive life for their children with disabilities.

This group received funding for a Family Coordinator and moved to its first official office on Weber Street in Waterloo.

In November 2013, EAFWR held its **first Match Celebration** where nearly 100 Direct

Support People and the people being supported were honoured.

We had two matches that had been going on for over 25 years. What a milestone!





We love our partnerships with different neighbourhoods in Waterloo Region. We're grateful to have partnered with Stanley Park Community Association over the years for the annual Ball Hockey tournament at Neighbours Day.

In September 2019, we hosted "Coffee, Treats & an Inclusive Community", part of Kitchener Waterloo Community Foundation and Cambridge & North Dumfries Community Foundation's On the Table. We were happy to take part in this community-wide initiative!



FUN FACTS ABOUT EAFWR

In 2007, our first **Walk-or-Wheel (WOW) event**, known as the Wellness Walk and Wheel, was held at Bingermans. From 2009 to 2012, this annual event moved to Victoria Park in Kitchener. After a brief pause, WOW returned in 2017 with outdoor activities, food, music and connections. We pivoted to a virtual format in 2021 as a way for our community to be #virtuallyBetterTogether.



The **Maria de Boer Changemaker Award** was first introduced in 2018. Named in recognition of Maria de Boer, Executive Director of EAFWR for nearly 35 years, the award honour someone who identifies as disabled/having a disability who makes a positive impact for others in some way.



MESSAGE FROM BOARD TREASURER

In our 2020-2021 Annual Report, we began by stating that our 2020-2021 fiscal year was a year like no other. At that point, we had all anticipated that the 2021-2022 year would bring more opportunities to connect with one another, and our community as a whole. Unfortunately, the COVID-19 pandemic continued to have ripple effects everywhere, including at Extend-A-Family Waterloo Region (EAFWR). However, the team at EAFWR, the people we support and their families continued to work together to seek out opportunities to engage as fully as possible. This resulted in 85% of individual funding contracts being utilized, a return to pre-pandemic spending levels indicating that despite ever changing recommendations and restrictions, people continued to be able to access services and supports.

The Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services (MCCSS) continued to provide expanded guidelines and funding flexibility, allowing both people supported and the agency to be responsive to changing needs, and the Temporary Wage Enhancement Subsidy provided an opportunity to increase wages for front-line support, acknowledging their essential role in our community, without impacting the number of hours of support provided.

Prior Year

This year, we identified a \$550,200 misstatement of revenue in the prior year's financial statements. An adjustment has been made to restate the 2020/2021 EAFWR financial statements to include \$550,200 of MCCSS funding and revenue from PassportONE not recognized in the previous fiscal year. These misstatements were attributed to pandemic related changes.

Current Year

During the current year, we received a total of \$12,852,606 through a combination of Ministry funding, family Passport funds, service fees, grants and fundraising. The Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy was not required this year to successfully maintain our staffing and program delivery levels.

We incurred a total of \$12,642,124 in costs for service delivery, program expenses, salaries and wages and other support costs. This activity resulted in a net surplus of \$210,482 and an ending cash and investments balance of \$1,749,783.

With the surplus for the fiscal year, we are able to contribute again as planned to our restricted Operating Reserve fund that was established by the Board of Directors after the 2018-2019 fiscal year. The purpose of the restricted Operating Reserve is to be a security for unforeseen operational requirements and support emerging operational objectives.

It has been a pleasure to spend another year with EAFWR as the Board Treasurer, and I look forward to the year ahead. We are just getting started!


